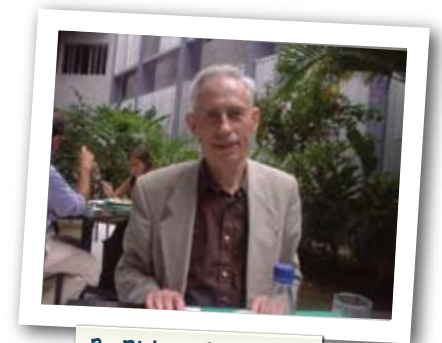

Famous Philosopher Helps Launch Institute's 25th Anniversary Year

Ranking among the world's leading Christian philosophers (along with Drs. Alvin Plantinga and Nicholas Wolterstorff, who have previously lectured for the Institute), Dr. Richard Swinburne comes from Oxford University to speak November 10 at 7:00 p.m.

He is among nearly 20 Christian scholars who, as campus lecturers, will help the Institute celebrate its 25th anniversary year, which will culminate on April 27, 2007 with a 25th Anniversary Lecture by Christian thinker Dr. Os Guinness.

Swinburne, who is the Nolloth Professor Emeritus of the Philosophy of the Christian Religion, will deliver the 11th annual Holmer Memorial Lecture in 125 Willey Hall on the U's West Bank. The subject of his address will be *God and Morality*, which will provide a philosophical argument for why God's existence has enormous implications for the substance of moral truths.

"With Dr. Swinburne's presence, we are continuing Christian philosopher Paul Holmer's great tradition," said Institute Executive Director Dr. Bob Osburn. "Dr. Holmer sought to 'make Christian sense'—his words—of all of life. Dr. Swinburne does this so very well."

The Institute's Fall 2007 schedule actually begins September 22-23 with a conference on Christianity and the environment titled "Pristine Harmony." It's not too late to register for the conference, which has a registration charge of \$50 (\$25 for students) if registered by September 10 (\$65/\$35 thereafter), and which will be held on the U's St. Paul campus. More than 10 academic papers will be delivered by scholars from across North America, as well as plenary lectures by leading Christian environmental scholars like Dr. Cal DeWitt (University of Wisconsin), Dr. Susan Emmerich, and others. Other Fall 2006 campus speakers include Providence College's Dr. Anthony Esolen, international journalists Mustafa Akyol and Denyse O'Leary, and Baylor University's Dr. Ralph Wood.

"As a Christian study center, our conferences and lectures are all geared to making Christ's presence felt and heard in the very center of academic life," said Osburn. "This caliber of speakers—not to mention our fabulous Winter/Spring 2007 line-up that includes Guinness—helps makes the vision a reality."

Since its founding in 1982 by Dr. William Monsma, the Institute has sponsored over 125 different Christian scholars as University of Minnesota campus lecturers, most of them since the year 2000. Lecturers have included Christian historian Dr. George Marsden (Notre Dame), apologist Dr.

Ravi Zacharias, and Dr. Philip Johnson, widely considered the founder of the Intelligent Design movement.

"We are about to begin a wonderfully historic year in the life of the Institute," said Osburn. "God has been extraordinarily gracious in giving us a place as a leading regional voice for Christian scholarship in the secular university. Our guest lecturers give witness to the transforming potential inherent within the Christian worldview embodied in the person and work of Jesus Christ. Richard Swinburne, as our Fall 2006 Holmer lecturer, perfectly exemplifies that."

Institute Welcomes New Campus Minister

The Institute is pleased to announce that Pete Lackey will join our staff on September 1 as campus minister. Pete's mission is in collaboration with InterVarsity Christian Fellowship. 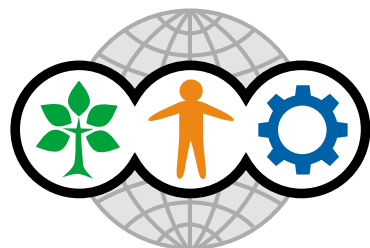
The focus of this collaboration with InterVarsity Christian Fellowship is to build the Mars Hill

Dr. John Deen Becomes New Board Chair of Institute

MacLaurin Institute: Tell us a bit about your academic background and your work here at the University of Minnesota.

John Deen: I am a veterinarian with a master's degree in veterinary epidemiology and a Ph.D. in epidemiology and production economics. I am also a board-certified specialist in swine health management. My work here at the University of Minnesota is in the College of Veterinary Medicine. I do research in pig health and welfare, and I teach veterinary and graduate students. I also work with farmers and veterinarians here in Minnesota, as well as other states and countries.

Institute: Where did you grow up and how did you become a Christian?

Deen: I grew up on a swine farm in southern Ontario, Canada. I was blessed to be in a Christian family and community that welcomed me as one of God's own children. I can't name a time when I could say that I was not a Christian but instead there were various times when the grace of God became more and more obvious and irresistible in my life.

Institute: How did you become involved with the Institute?

Deen: I met Bob Osburn as he gave a talk in a Sunday school class in my church shortly after I arrived at the University of Minnesota. I come from a Kuyperian tradition that emphasizes the integration of God in all aspects of endeavor. The MacLaurin Institute was exactly what I was looking for in helping me in creating a broad definition of my calling here at the U.

Institute: How do you see the Institute impacting students and faculty at the University of Minnesota?

Deen: I think that the MacLaurin Institute is designed to open the eyes of Christians and non-Christians to recognize God is already here on campus. We need to recognize God and His handiwork in all aspects of creation and society. We need to celebrate the beauties of the natural and man-made aspects of this world and that beauty is only truly recognized through the prism of God's grace. We need that same prism to recognize our shortfalls and methods for improvement. The MacLaurin Institute helps Christians create community to help each other and brings in a range of ideas to help us recognize the grace and will of God in further glorious detail.

Institute: What challenges are there for Christians as they enter the academy?

Deen: Following on the previous point, there is a tendency to box God in to a narrow range of moral issues, if there is any room for God at all. We end up with a God of a narrow worldview, a God of Sundays or a God of religiosity, rather than a God of life. I used to think that the challenge to Christians was to change the academy to accept a broader Christian worldview, but I don't anymore. Creating a cogent and integrated Christian worldview is hard work, demanding a broad study and relies on a strong community. I think that Christians are attracted to a narrow dualistic worldview because it is easier, and too often we slip into a comfortable dualism between our Christian activities and our academic activities. The challenge is to create a mutual discipline among Christians to taste and see our God in labs, lectures and literature.
